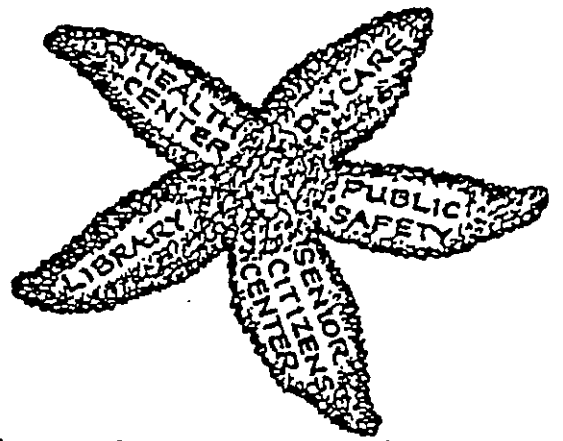

2014 SUMMER CAMPERSHIPS

This is the 14th summer the FRIENDS OF TEIA will have offered fully funded "camperships" to all island resident children. The "camperships" provide your child with the opportunity to learn new skills and make many new friends in the sailing, tennis, kid's camp, theater, and preteen programs. Your child must have completed kindergarten for the kid's camp and tennis programs and be at least eight years old and able pass a swim test for the sailing program. The one week (July 14-20th) theater camp is offered for children 9 to 15 years old. The preteen afternoon program is for children 10 to 12 years old. Last summer 63 children participated in the various educational camps.

ICE POND UPDATE

The island community's support of the Ice Pond acquisition and preservation continues to be overwhelming. Thank you to all who attended our Icebreaker celebration at the Inn in late February and to all the volunteers who made it possible, particularly the Cool Breeze Band and Robert Van Dee Steenhoven for his stone frog sculpture. While not meant to be a fundraiser, the Icebreaker brought in over \$2800 toward the Ice Pond.

Your response has put the Ice Pond project in very good standing. Preserving the Pond consists of two parts: funding the purchase of the Pond, and repairing the dam and desilting the Pond. Thanks to your support, we now have enough money to ensure the Ice Pond acquisition. PILP is now in the process of raising money, both from individuals and grant organizations, to pay the cost of dam and pond repair. Thank you!

Do you have expired prescriptions on your shelves which could benefit from spring cleaning? The Portland Police Department at 109 Middle Street accepts outdated unused prescription medications in tablet form twenty-four hours a day. The meds must be in the original container.

No liquids or over-the-counter drugs are accepted. These can be disposed of in household trash if they are diluted or absorbed by coffee grounds, cat litter or dirt, and placed in a container.

It is important to keep such meds away from children, and you will help protect our environment by disposing of them safely.

The Peaks Information Exchange (PIE) is a volunteer service organization created with the help of the Island Institute in 2002 to provide technical assistance for all Island organizations. PIE assists any organization with collecting, analyzing, presenting, distributing, and storing information. PIE facilitates inter-organizational collaboration on projects. PIE offers to warehouse information digitally by scanning and creating computer folders on disk backup for any organization. This sort of storage can be compatible for websites.

PIE leadership consists of Art Astarita, Jay Desmond, and Steve Bushey. Meetings are held when necessary by consensus through email or phone. Interested in helping? Contact Art, Jay or Steve.

PIE funding has been provided primarily through the generous donations of the Peaks business community listed on www.peaksisland.info, the Peaks Island Lions Club, the Island Institute and volunteer efforts of its' members. Annual expenses include the web site domain and hosting costs (~\$60), ink and paper (minimal cost). Cost for the McAfee antivirus software is donated.

In 2002, PIE was formed with the assistance of the Island Institute and then Peaks Island Fellow-Nate Gray. A grant from MBNA facilitated computer hardware and software. This hardware includes an Epson scanner for text and positive and negative photos, an 11x17 format printer, a laptop and desktop. Software includes a full MS office professional suite, GIS software that includes and QGIS (freeware) and ESRI ArcMap.
