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

**ELECTION OF DIRECTORS** 


The Casco Bay Island Transit District will conduct its annual elections on Tuesday, November 5, 2002, (the same day as Portland City Elections) to fill three vacancies on the Board of Directors. Directors' terms are staggered so that some expire every year. The term of office is three years for the three directorships expiring this year: (1) Peaks Island, (1) Little Diamond Island and (1) Great Diamond Island. Each of these five seats must be filled.


Candidates must be residents or property owners of the island they wish to represent.


Candidates must obtain the signatures of at least twenty (20) currently registered island voters (i.e., registered to vote in any island precinct) on nomination petitions. Candidates are advised to obtain more than twenty signatures, as some must invariably be disregarded because the signer is not a registered island voter at the time. A nomination petition provides spaces for forty (40) signatures.

Petition forms will be available during normal business hours at the CBITD ticket office at the Casco Bay Ferry Terminal, 56 Commercial St., Portland. Forms must be returned to the office, properly fill out and **NOTARIZED**, no later than 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 15, 2002. Prospective candidates can pick up the packets around the first of October. Complete information will be posted on each island and flyers placed on the vessels and in the CBL terminal.

This is a significant opportunity to help shape the policies of the District, which affect all of our daily lives, and thus make a significant contribution to our island community. At the very least, be sure to vote.

Many islanders attended the Land Preserve's annual meeting on July 26. New and old members signed in. Donations were made; and many people volunteered to help with future cleanups and data collections on the Peaks lands under conservation easement. Two new board members were elected. #### Islanders Participate in Planning Workshop

More than 150 Peaks Islanders planned their future August 4th at a four-hour, Neighborhood-Based Plan Workshop arranged by volunteer community members.

Attendees discussed findings by a dozen volunteer Planning Task Teams that have been researching topics ranging from population and housing to water and other natural resources, marine resources, historic and architectural resources, land use patterns, transportation, recreation, public facilities, the economy, and relations with the City of Portland.

Task teams also presented data compiled with the Island-wide Community Survey conducted earlier this year. More than 550 full-time and part-time Islanders completed the six-page survey that offers insight into virtually all aspects of life on the island.

Workshop attendees provided information for a draft Neighborhood-Based Plan that will be submitted to the City of Portland's Planning Department later this year.
