



PEAKS ISLAND LAND PRESERVE

The Peaks Island Land Preserve purchased the last piece of the Ballfield Woods at the end of July. We kicked off a \$50,000 capital campaign to pay for the property. To date, about \$26,000 has been raised.

On September 21, the Oceanside Conservation Trust, the sister land trust of the Land Preserve, voted to give a matching grant of \$10,000 for the Ballfield Woods Fund, leaving another \$14,000 to be raised.

A festive fundraising event will take place on **Sunday, October 9**, starting at **2:30**, at the **Ballfield**. There will be games and food. All are welcome. Bring your own baseball team or come as a free agent. Flexible or wacky rules may apply. Signup sheets will be posted at Hannigan's, the Café, and on the Bulletin Board. Peaks Island Relief Fund HURRICANE KATRINA FUNDRAISER

On Sunday, September 11, the Peaks Island community gathered for a spontaneous outpouring of spirit and compassion, to raise money for those in need as a result of Hurricane Katrina. Masterminded by George Blood, Paul Brahms and Lisa Lynch, the event drew more than 200 people for a raffle and silent auction, food, music, horseback rides, face painting, t-shirt decorating, a kissing booth, a dunking booth, charcoal portraits, toilet flushing, dancing in the streets, and other forms of merriment. The event generated \$15,365.67!!

From the funds raised, \$4166 went to the Red Cross. The remaining \$11,000+ will be disbursed to organizations providing direct aid to or by friends and family of Peaks Island residents. \$6000 went with Pam Richards, who traveled to Slidell, Louisiana on September 26 to be with family members affected by the hurricane. Pam will volunteer with FBC Relief, a group organized through the local Baptist Church, which has been feeding and caring for thousands of people. Several other disbursements are pending. Any Peaks Islander who would like to request aid for family or friends in need as a result of the hurricane should bring it to the attention of Lisa Lynch. Donations to the Peaks Island Relief Fund can continue to be made at the Peaks Cafe.

Children age 6-23 months should also be immunized. The flu clinic this year will be on Wednesday, 10/27/05 at the Library/Community Center. Portland VNA staff will be here from 8:15 am to 12 noon. Home Health VNS will be here from 1:15-4:30. The Health Center will have a limited amount of flu vaccine for our regular patients who are at high risk. The charge for flu shots is \$20 or, for people covered by Medicare Part B, free if you bring your Medicare card.

I'm writing this on Sunday, Sept. 25 just after service, social time and a Trustee Meeting. The Trustees expressed their thanks to Gunnar Elofson and all of his hard work in the process of painting the church building and thanks to all of you who donated to have the work done! After estimates this committee set the goal for funding the painting and necessary repairs of the stairs at \$15,000. We received \$15,655 in donations. The total bill at the end of the work was \$15,600. God is good.

One of the other topics of conversation today at that same meeting was the rising cost of heating oil. We're fortunate to be able to offer community meeting space but worry about soaring prices. If you benefit from one of the groups that meet there or want to help keep it open through out the winter months, please consider a donation toward the fuel fund. Your donation is tax deductible; just mark the memo "fuel fund" and we'll be certain it goes toward that end.

At our next Spirituality meeting on October 23 from 7-8 p.m. Ellie Springer, a Reiki Master Therapist will offer a presentation on Reiki which is a form of gentle hands-on healing that was rediscovered from ancient Buddhist texts by a Japanese monk in the early 20th century. The word "Reiki" means spiritually guided life energy. We will talk about how this healing works on the physical, psychological and spiritual levels of the body. PINA NEWS

NEXT PEAKS ISLAND NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION GENERAL MEETING: Tuesday, November 15, 7:30 PM at the Community Center

The SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING of PINA had a short discussion by City Island/Neighborhood Administrator Tom Fortier of tax issues in which he talked about the expanded state circuit breaker program, for which many more Peaks Islanders are eligible than previously, and the plans of City Councillor Jim Cloutier to create a City circuit breaker and/or homestead program to address the problems resulting from the enormous increases in valuation of most properties here. He urged Peaks Islanders to complete applications for the existing circuit breaker program. A guest, mortgage broker Brendan Hickey, described mortgage products now available with reduced monthly payments such as interest-only loans and reverse mortgages. In each instance the homeowner would have no reduction in principal debt.

Mike Richards, the Moderator of the Peaks Island Independence Committee, described its activities and conclusions. The Committee is now studying financing and governance options for an independent Town of Peaks Island. Its figures indicate that when taxes are based on the new valuations Peaks will pay about \$5,000,000 a year and will receive about \$3,000,000 in services. Peaks, of course, benefits from some expenditures affecting the City as a whole.

The Committee has been collecting signatures of island voters on a petition to initiate the process that may eventually lead to secession from the City of Portland and now has about 550 signatures, more than the required 50% of Peaks Island voters. Once the City validates the signatures a public hearing before the City Council will be held. After the hearing a lengthy procedure must be followed. The City must hold an advisory referendum on Peaks and the City Council may decide to hold a referendum in the remainder of the City as well. After the referenda the State Legislature will make a final decision on secession for Peaks. Mike said that the Legislature would want evidence of good planning before voting approval.

Mike discussed some consequences of independence. Decisions now made by the City would be made here; we would be our own masters, but with power goes responsibility and holding neighbors responsible for decisions unpopular with some people could be divisive. The potentially most unpopular decisions, those of the tax assessor and the code officer, would probably be made by nonresident professionals. It was noted that Long Island, with fewer residents, requires about fifty people, some paid and some volunteer, to run the town.

PINA DOES NOT SUPPORT OR OPPOSE SECESSION. It sees that this issue is of vital importance for Peaks Islanders and therefore is providing a forum in which all positions on the question may be presented. Mike Richards, who represents a group generally supportive of secession, presented his views at this meeting. We hope and expect that other views will be presented at future meetings.

Cynthia Pedlikin described the operations of the Peaks Island Tax Assistance Committee, designed to provide confidential financial assistance to residents having difficulty meeting the increased property tax burden. The Committee has raised more than \$10,000. Contributions are tax deductible.

The Steering Committee will have its bi-monthly meeting on Tuesday, October 18, at 7 P.M. at the Community Center.
