P.I. NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION NEWS

At the Steering Committee Meeting on November 9, there was much discussion about proposing a change to the current zoning code, particularly the IB (Business) Zone on Peaks Island as relates to residential construction within the business zone. There will be a meeting in the future to focus on zoning issues.

Also discussed was the current status of the Deer Management Plan which needs to be substantially in progress prior to the ME Dept. of Inland Fisheries & Wildlife initiating a culling of the deer herd on the Island as voted by a majority of Peaks Island voters and the Portland City Council. The plan is to convene a committee representing all points of view to formulate an ongoing management plan for future control of the herd, and to have this plan in place by the end of January, 2000.

A number of break-ins into dwellings was reported, and in response Public Safety has been stepping-up their watch. There was a suggestion that "neighborhood watch" groups be organized. This will be the main topic of discussion at the next General PINA Meeting, where Sergeant Betters will be present to discuss public safety concerns.

SAFETY TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAYS FROM PEAKS ISLAND SAFETY

The holiday season is here, and we want you to have a happy and safe time. Here are some suggestions for you to consider.

If you use a real Christmas tree, be sure it is <u>well watered</u>. When you are looking for that tree, look for a tree that is fresh cut. You can tell that a tree is fresh cut if you bend one of the needles, it should not be brittle, and it should bend. Check those lights that go on the tree. Look for broken wires or bulbs. Don't try to repair broken light strings, replace them. Be sure that the tree is well away from heat sources, like stoves and registers. Keep cords under rugs, and be sure they are away so people don't trip over them.

Candles are parts of the holiday celebration, watch out for combustible materials and children.

Are you looking for that special gift? Try a smoke or carbon monoxide detector, these run around \$10.00 and are a gift that keeps giving all year.

When attending parties, don't let someone drive home who is intoxicated, make sure they get a ride from someone who is sober.
