

Winter is here, and along with that comes slippery roads and increased accidents. We have had many complaints this last month about children not being properly secured in safety seats or seatbelts. Please don't make a quick ride around the Island turn tragic. Even a 5 MPH crash is enough to seriously injure an adult, imagine what that could do to your child.

Some of you may have noticed that we have been enforcing the drop off and pick up rules on Welch St. There have been numerous complaints about the traffic jams caused by people parking at the bottom of Welch St. waiting to load or unload people. Please keep in mind that you should not drive down to the end and wait for people or items. This needs to be done after the Ferry leaves to ensure the safety of passengers and pedestrians. We should also remember to please use the sidewalk as there are many vehicles driving up and down the roads.

Abandoned vehicles: If you have a vehicle that is parked on the road, please make arrangements to have the vehicle removed. This is a must when it comes to plowing, sanding, and general driving. This is an Island wide problem and one of the biggest complaints we receive. Please be part of the solution, not the problem.

Several summonses and multiple warnings have been issued this summer for underage drinking. We have seen an increase from previous years, and would like the parents to get involved before MEDCU needs to.

Peaks Island Land Preserve

Through a generous grant from MBNA, the Peaks Island Land Preserve was recently able to purchase a Global Positioning System, or GPS. The GPS will be used for collecting data on PILP properties, including the locations of boundaries as well as natural and man-made features, and will greatly increase both the accuracy and the efficiency of such efforts. PILP will be collaborating with the Peaks Information Exchange to create digital maps of the properties using the GPS data, and to make those maps available to the residents of Peaks Island. Will Mitchell of Mitchell Geographics has generously offered to assist with training PILP board members and land stewards, and PILP hopes in the future to be able to offer GPS training to other members of the Peaks community as well.

In its current campaign to preserve the Ballfield Woods, the Peak's Island Land Preserve continues to work toward a \$10,000 fundraising goal for a matching donation. Contributions are still being accepted, and can be mailed to: PILP, PO Box 99, Peaks Island, Maine, 04108.

NEXT PEAKS ISLAND NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION GENERAL MEETING: Tuesday, January 17, 7:30 PM at the Community Center

The NOVEMBER GENERAL MEETING of PINA was a session of only a half hour preceding a workshop of the Portland City Council on the finances of a possible Peaks Island secession. At this PINA meeting Jerry Garman was elected to a two-year term on the Steering Committee and City Island/Neighborhood Administrator Tom Fortier asked interested Peaks Islanders to join a "Friends of Trott-Littlejohn Park" committee to address needs of the park and make recommendations about appropriate activities there.

PINA DOES NOT SUPPORT OR OPPOSE SECESSION FROM THE CITY OF PORTLAND. It sees this issue as of vital importance for Peaks Islanders and therefore is providing a forum in which all positions on the question may be presented.

There are now three levels of PINA membership, basic member for two dollars, friend of PINA for five dollars, and PINA patron for ten dollars. We invite you to visit the new PINA WEBSITE, www.PinaInfo.org, a source of information about past, present, and future activities of PINA as well as other island activities.

The Steering Committee will have its bi-monthly meeting on Tuesday, December 20, at 7 P.M. at the Community Center.

Trott Littlejohn Park: The transformation of the old gravel pit is complete. The next step is to define the appropriate use and maintenance of the property. For example, should we mow it regularly or leave it to grow naturally? What are the park hours, sunrise to sunset? Will there be a place to ice skate? If you would like to be part of the short and long term planning process, please join me on the committee "Friends of Littlejohn Park". The first meeting will be Wednesday, November 30th at 3:00pm at the Community Center.

Sewer extension: A study for the extension of public sewer in the areas of Winding Way and Island Avenue (Mechanic Street to Ocean Street) has been completed by Woodard and Curran. The cost of the project was estimated at 2.2 million dollars and would service approximately 50 homes. While there are no plans to move forward on this project immediately, a public meeting will be held (summer 2006) and residents within the study area will be notified. At that time, those outside the study area can request that the service area be extended.

Deer Management: The deer management plan is scheduled for January 2006. All notices are posted on the Community Center bulletin board, the Casco Bay Lines ferry, by e-mail, and announcements at public meetings and "down front". The goal each year is to reduce the deer population to the identified wildlife management standard of 15-20. This is called "the carrying capacity" and is specific to Peaks Island. Resident Robert Briggs, MDIFW biologist Phil Bozenhard, and I are present during the implementation of the program. Robert and Phil operate from stationary sites that have been carefully designed and considered for safety.

Secession: The City's web page will be providing links to informative documents relative to the secession process. The goal is to welcome the exchange of information, questions, and concerns. www.portlandmaine.gov
