TIMES DO CHANGE

The following oddities of historical Maine are taken from authenticated town records.

July 10, 1645. John Baker was fined ten shillings for drawing his sword and running after Indians and five shillings for throwing a fire shovel at his wife.

October 18, 1649. Edward Starbuck was haled before the court for "greate misdemeanor—wearing his hair beyond statute length in the manner of ruffians and Indians."

October 30, 1659. Lady Jilliam Pinkham was fined five shillings per day for having missed thirteen Sundays at meeting. Her husband refused to pay and Lady Jilliam was set in the public "stocks".

May 22, 1662. Town meeting "ordered ~~that~~ a cage be made—to punish such as sleep or take tobacco on the Lord's day."

June 1662. Price quotations!

September 15, 1668. The court enjoined the town to provide the following "accompanymments of civilization": a whipping post, stocks, a pound and a powder match.

May 3, 1707. The land bounded by Forest Ave., Congress St., and Washington Ave., extending to Back Bay sold for 5 shillings (\$1.20). Present valuation is upward from \$18,000,000.

October 29, 1727. A terrific earthquake shook Portland—windows broke, chimneys toppled and the following Sunday 41 people joined the church.

October 1735. Sickness hit Portland—throat distemper. Of the first 40 stricken not one recovered. In all over a quarter of the population died.

1745. Man about town, Joshua Freeman, was the style plate of the year "wearing full bottomed curled wig, neck ruffles, scarlet coat, white vest and stockings, shoes with silver buckles, two watches (one on either side) and carrying a gold headed cane".

1762. Snow everyday December 3 to December 28. Fifteen feet deep in places. A scandal of sorts developed when a party of six couples (not all married) were marooned thirteen days by the snow. There was a food scare—famine threatened—and tea sold at \$19 a pound, corn \$35 a bushel, and flour for \$2 a pound.

Times do change—but the problems were the same—finance and food and taxes.
